8 Tips for Traveling with Pets

Maybe the hotel doesn't accommodate pets, your pet gets a little antsy flying or can't sit still on a road trip. But there are a quite a few ways to make traveling a little easier with them. 1. Time to fly: If your pet is going to fly with you, it's essential that you check carrier size restrictions beforehand. Keep in mind that small dogs can usually sit with you and larger dogs will fly in the cargo section in a crate.

2. Carrier comfort: Let your pet sleep in the bed or crate they'll be calling home for your travels at least a month before leaving. Traveling to an unknown destination is scary enough on its own.

3. Buckle up: Your pet needs a seatbelt too if they're not in a carrier. Dog seatbelts give them freedom to move around, but they'll be safe in case there is a car accident.

4. Feeding time: Pets can easily get carsick. Feed them no less than five or six hours before traveling to avoid cleaning up a mess.

5. Hospitable hotel: Even though a hotel is "pet friendly," this doesn't mean pets can stay in the room alone. Consider a nearby Camp Bow Wow doggie day care facility to avoid this problem.

6. Home sweet home: Bring their favorite things from home: dishes, blankets, toys or anything that can comfort them.
