Central Arizona:

Boyce Thompson Arboretum State Park

This national forest located near Superior —featuring Arizona's oldest and largest botanical garden—is home to pistachio trees, hackberry black walnut and Arizona sycamore trees. Make sure to visit for Thanksgiving Weekend Fall Foliage Finale Festival on Nov. 25-26.
