Valley Domestic Violence Shelter Launches Give the Gala Campaign

New Life Center, the largest domestic violence shelter in Maricopa County and one of the largest in the country, recently launched the "Give the Gala" campaign which aims to raise a portion of funds that the organization's previous charitable giving events did. Due to COVID-19, the shelter canceled its annual Secret Garden Gala, but the need to serve survivors of domestic and sexual violence remains.

"Coronavirus has caused our campus, which provides crucial support and safety to individuals affected by domestic violence and sexual abuse, to face a unique set of challenges," says Myriah Mhoon, New Life Center CEO. "Annually, we serve more than 1,000 men, women, and children through emergency shelter and supportive community services. Closing the financial gap that the pandemic has caused will allow us to make sure survivors are safe."

In previous years, the shelter's special event raised upwards of \$110,000. This year, the campaign will allow community members interested in giving back to donate at different levels. Contribution tiers include:

- Level 1 \$10,000 Support a family with all their basic needs, meals, case management, safety planning, support groups, emotional support, access to
- resources, lay legal advocacy, and connection to long term housing. Level 2 \$5,000 Feed all of the people living at the shelter three meals a day for one month.
- Level 3 \$1,000 Fund first month's rent for one family exiting the shelter, so that they can get settled into their new home. • Level 4 – \$500 – Provide 12 survivors living at the shelter with new pillows and
- bedding so they can sleep comfortably.
 Level 5 \$250 Fund diapers for a newborn baby during their whole stay, four months, at the shelter.
- Level 6 \$125 Provide one day of crisis line services with a trained advocate.
 Level 7 \$65 Fund one night safe and free from worry in the emergency shelter.
 Level 8 \$25 Provide cleaning and sanitation supplies to keep shelter residents and staff safe and healthy.

The campaign is currently less than \$8,000 away from its goal.

"The outpouring of support we always receive from our community is incredibly encouraging," Mhoon says. "Our operation would not be possible without these donations, no matter how small or large."
