CLAY highlights a diverse selection of ceramic artwork by talented local artists from around out state offering visitors an eclectic array of art, history, imagery, and fun! The powerful and emotionally charged work by Constance McBride depicts two mature faces resting upon each other titled "Whispers". A stunning ceramic sculpture coated with powdered graphite reflecting upon the artist's experiences dealing with "an aging mother and daughters, as well as added layer of Alzheimer's disease". Elaine Isner's witty and quirky ceramic sculpture titled "Artist and Model," depicts a female figure holding a briefcase and rooster walking through the grass.



Christine Cassano's Manumission an alluring mixed media kinetic installation that is suspended from the ceiling, featuring a translucent round panel layered with twine with over 300 hand formed porcelain pieces and small round mirrors tethered down and spilling onto the floor.



The abstract ivory organic forms titled "Sirens I, II, III" created by Danielle Wood are porcelain with a low fired crawl glaze inspired by a



collaboration with poet Angie Dell and are the artist's interruption of the main characters in the poem.

"Art After Work Series" continues with create your own masterpiece taking place on December 9th from 6 to 8:30pm in the Gallery with "Paint What You Want". This is a wonderful opportunity to enjoy an open studio with no instructor, only costing \$25 this price includes a canvas, art
