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The nationally-renowned, traveling art exhibit, "Portraits of Courage: A Commander in Chief's Tribute to America's Warriors" exhibit has made its official debut in the Valley of the Sun.

The Arizona Historical Society, in partnership with the George W. Bush Institute and the Sandra Day O'Connor Institute, is hosting "Portraits of Courage" at the Arizona Heritage Center. Tempe is only the fourth U.S. city that has been given the opportunity to host the paintings this year.

"I hope that people can get a better understanding of the plight of our service men and women. We all understand that war is difficult, but with these men and women, it's on their faces what they've been through," said Tawn Downs, Vice President of Communications and Revenue Marketing at the Arizona Historical Society. "So, I hope people come away with a better understanding of what these men and women go through. But also, to understand that there's hope that they can recover and that there are resources available to them."
